

Jefferson Memorial Forest Programs

Jefferson Memorial Forest (JMF) is located in Southwest Louisville, encompasses over 6,700 acres and is the base for environmental education, experiential education, and outdoor recreation activities for Metro Parks and Recreation. JMF serves JCPS, parochial and private schools, as well as homeschool, scout, and youth groups. All of our programs are hands-on, interdisciplinary, and correlated to KY Academic Standards and Next Generation Science Standards.

On-site facilities and features include an Environmental Education Center that showcases native wildlife, flora and fauna, an outdoor Nature Explore Classroom (the first certified Nature Explore Classroom in Kentucky), Shannon's Pond (a rehabilitated wetland habitat to support aquatic environmental education programs), small streams, scenic trails and a variety of ecosystems. In addition to programs offered onsite, our highly trained staff is available to visit school yards, local parks, and other natural areas throughout Louisville Metro.

Additional experiential education programs offered include team-building and classroom community development programs, utilizing our Teams Course

These programs teach cooperation, conflict resolution, problem-solving, and group cohesion for middle and high school students.

Other programs unique to JMF include Orienteering, Archery, Survival Skills, Canoeing, Kentucky's First People (American Indian education), and Bring a Book to Life, featuring Hatchet, My Side of the Mountain, and Children of the Longhouse.

Preschool Forest Adventures

Each program area listed below lasts one hour and includes an additional hour in our Nature Explore Classroom for a total of two hours minimum based on selection(s). Programs are scheduled a la cart.

POND EXPLORATION

So many creatures live in a pond, from tadpoles to dragonfly nymphs. Children will collect a variety of animals with nets and examine them under a magnifying lens. Dress to get messy!

ABSOLUTELY ANIMALS

How do animals survive in the forest? What do they eat? Where do they live? How do they hide? In autumn, a focus will be on how animals prepare for and survive the winter.

GOING BUGGY!

Grab a net and bug viewer and let's go! Catch a variety of bugs, view them up close, and learn about the differences between spiders and insects.

The Nature Explore Classroom is geared towards children 3-5 years old. The Building Area, Nature Art Area, Messy Materials Area, Climbing Area, Music Area, and Digging Area stimulate creativity and develop motor skills while connecting children to nature. It is messy fun!

KINDERGARTEN TO THIRD GRADE

ABSOLUTELY ANIMALS

Learn about the adaptations, behaviors, and survival needs of Kentucky's native wildlife. Get up close and personal with live animals in our nature center!

GRADES 4 TO 8

Experience, hands-on, the technology and complexity of daily life of the first people of Kentucky. Can cover any time period from the Paleo-Indians to the historic tribes of Kentucky.

BRING A BOOK TO LIFE

GRADES 3 TO 8

Truly one of a kind, this program immerses students in the actual experiences of the characters from three unique books: Jean Craighead George's My Side of the Mountain (gr. 3-8); Gary Paulsen's Hatchet (gr. 4-8); and Joseph Bruchac's Children of the Longhouse (gr. 3-5). Identify wild edibles, build shelters out of ma-



terials gathered in the forest. learn how to build a fire with flint and steel, discover how to track animals. and more! For best experience, we recommend that students complete book prior to visit. ORIENTEERING: WHICH WAY DO WE GO?

GRADES 6 AND OLDER • MAXIMUM 30

Learn how to understand and apply basic map information, how to read a topographical map, and how to take and follow compass bearings from one location to another. Can be adapted to the age and ability level of the participants.



ARCHERY

AGES 8 AND OLDER • MAXIMUM 30

Learn to shoot a bow and arrow within minutes! Accommodates all levels of experience. All equipment provided. This program can be added as an supplementary component to other programs. Aligns with National Archery in the Schools (NASP) Curriculum.

CANOEING

AGES 10 AND OLDER • MAXIMUM 15

Learn the basics of flat-water canoeing on Jefferson Memorial Forest's beautiful Tom Wallace Lake. All equipment is provided, and lead staff on program are certified instructors with the American Canoe Association. Program availability subject to weather and water conditions. Participants must be comfortable around water and be able to sit in and paddle a canoe independently. *Canoeing programs have an instructor-to-student ratio of 1:6.

SURVIVAL SKILLS

AGES 8 AND OLDER • MAXIMUM 30

Have you ever wanted to learn how to build a fire using flint and steel? How about constructing a survival shelter using natural materials? Learn these two important skills with us as you experience hands on what it takes to survive in the woods.

ACCESSIBILITY

It is the intent of all Louisville Metro Parks & Recreation facilities to make programs and services accessible to all individuals regardless of ability level. If an accommodation is necessary for your participation, we ask that you advise Jefferson Memorial Forest staff of the needed service in advance of your visit. Before Your Trip

A confirmation packet will be emailed to the email address provided. The packet will include: a letter confirming the details of your trip, invoice, directions to the forest, and a waiver form that is to be filled out by a parent or legal guardian for each student. Any adults that will be participating in the program need to fill out a waiver as well.

Approximately 2 weeks prior to your trip, your coordinating instructor will call you to go over any guestions or concerns that you have, ensure that you received a confirmation packet, record any health concerns or disabilities, and determine what specific expectations and goals you have for your

Try to schedule a time to come out to the Forest before the day of the field trip. You can familiarize yourself with the directions and have a better idea of how long the drive will take. A pre-visit trip will also familiarize you with the area and the facilities.

Prepare nametags for the students. These should include the teacher's name and school. Review with students the importance of the tags and remind them not to discard their nametags in the Forest. (Stickers do not stay on clothes for long.)

Review Forest etiquette with students. Stress the importance of staying with program instructor at all times. It is important to be respectful and listen to the program instructor. Make sure that children understand that although they will be outside, they are entering the homes of other creatures, and they should be mindful not to disturb them with loud voices.


Check with parents regarding any allergies or health concerns the child may have such as asthma. Make sure the children bring with them any needed medications such as an inhaler or epi-pen, and that they (or the chaperone) know how to use it correctly. Parents may accompany their child. We strive to include all children with any health and/or physical ability needs. Your coordinating instructor will work with you to accommodate any special needs your students may have.

Make sure that you have enough chaperones (no less than one adult per 10 children). Inform chaperones of the physical nature of this field trip. There may be hiking involved for periods of 45 minutes to an hour and a half, some of which could be up hill and may be considered strenuous for those not used to physical exertion or who have specific health concerns.

Students and chaperones should dress appropriately for the weather and for the possibility of getting dirty, and wear closed-toed comfortable walking shoes.

Directions to Jefferson Memorial Forest Horine Center

From Louisville: Take I-65 South to exit 125 - Gene Snyder Freeway West. Use the right lane. Go 4.1 miles to exit 6, New Cut Road. At the stoplight, turn left onto New Cut Rd and follow for 1.6 miles. It will turn into Manslick Rd. After the Fairdale Library will be the roundabout. Take the first exit on to Mitchell Hill Rd. The Fairdale Fire Department will be on your left. Go .9 miles.

As you come around a curve and pass Keys Ferry Rd stay to the left on Mitchell Hill. Next, turn left onto Holsclaw Hill Rd. Go 1.5 miles up and around the knob. At the top of the hill you will see a green sign. Make a hairpin turn to the right into the Horine Reservation. Drive .3 miles down the paved road. You will pass 4 driveways and a house that has a sign reading "Private Residence." Continue watching for staff and signs for the program.
