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SummerWorks Youth Naturalist Program

Summer 2023

The Natural Areas SummerWorks youth had an eventful experience as naturalists. Their activities included participating in the Laurel Wilt Disease (LWD) Field day where they learned the background of the disease, how to collect samples from trees and how to perform diagnostic testing. They also explored fungicide trials and how drones are used in studying LWD. Also on the agenda were land management days at Beargrass Park where the SummerWorks naturalists helped to remove the invasive species HoneyBush Suckle. The youth facilitated indoor and outdoor activities at the Portland Community Center and Southwick Community Centers, as well as partnered with the Shawnee Branch of the Louisville Free Public Library to hold outdoor story times for young children and to facilitate ECHO nature-based play. During the summer, the youth attended a 2-day training at MSD on water quality, erosion prevention and sediment control, post construction design, construction and maintenance, and water quality sampling. They also met with a SummerWorks career coach who shared insight on resumes, how to pursue career goals, next steps for the coming school year, how to prepare for college, financial management and budgeting.

Land Management Perspectives

Summer 2023 has been filled with activity for the Natural Areas Land Management team. With the help of volunteers, we successfully planted 80 native trees in a reforestation planting project at Joe Creason Park during Tree Fest 2023. Our hard working volunteers also helped to finish a significant reroute on the Scott's Gap trail in order to avoid steep sections and hazardous creek crossings.Both volunteers and staff will participate in the official opening of the new entrance to Scott's Gap trail on August 19, 2023 (and the closing of the existing trail entrance).

Our Natural Areas team of staff and volunteers have also completed the resurfacing and widening of the Environment Education Stream trail, with just some fine-tuning remaining. We have been devoting time and effort to repair sections of various natural areas trails damaged by uprooted trees and erosion, as well as clearing the trails from storm debris and fallen trees.

This summer, we have been working to control invasive species in many natural areas properties. This included efforts with SummerWorks participants at Beargrass Creek Greenway. Our team has also planned and started installation of pollinator gardens at the Jefferson Memorial Forest Welcome Center and the Horine Conference Center.

In partnership with University of Kentucky and the Kentucky Division of Forestry, we hosted a field day studying and learning how to identify Laurel Wilt Disease (LWD), which is a new threat to our native Sassafras and Spice bush caused by the Redbay

Ambrosia beetle.

The Natural Areas Land Management team also reinforced and stabilized the Mitchell Hill Lake dam to ensure its integrity and safety. We conducted our annual survey of Kentucky glade cress at McNeely Park and are continuing to establish a healthy ecosystem within the park. We are continuing the ongoing maintenance of the Louisville Loop and the care of trees planted in previous years as part of a larger reforestation effort within Jefferson Memorial Forest.

Through the hard work and dedication of the Natural Areas staff and volunteers, we have had an eventful, productive, and successful summer!

Staff Blog Spotlight

A Profile of Rachel Young

This quarter we are highlighting a new member of our team of Naturalists

1. Where did you grow up? I grew up in a 100-year-old house in south Louisville near the Iroquois Library and Iroquois Park. My parents have lived in the house where they raised

2. What drew you to the outdoors both as a child and

me for nearly fifty years!

I am the youngest of eleven siblings, and all of us spent a lot of time outside. When so many other things were cost prohibitive for a family that size, exploring outdoors was a free way to escape an often-cramped house. We had the privilege of living near several "pocket parks" and down the street from the expansive Iroquois Park. On weekends, we would load into our parents' station wagon and head to Bernheim Forest to explore in creeks and woods. Now, I still experience a sense of childlike wonder when I step into a natural space. I want to know the names of all the birds, insects, plants, and fungi that surround me.

3. What does a naturalist's work entail?

So much! My day-to-day varies depending on the season. Summer is obviously camp season, so we just wrapped up several weeks of hosting excited kiddos at the Forest. In the fall and spring, I will be working with our youth team building, Kentucky's First People, Bring a Book to Life, and canoeing programs. Other naturalists on our team work with schools and community centers through our ECHO program, conduct archery programming, and lead environmental education field trips.

4. How did you get interested in becoming a naturalist?

As a kid, I had great mentors that taught me to view nature through a magical lens. My dad was my first naturalist, sharing fun facts about trees and rock formations with his kids every chance he got. I always knew that I wanted to share the gift he gave me to dress in costume as with others. After graduating college with a

degree in Sustainability Education, I spent several years as a classroom science teacher in middle and high schools here in Louisville. I absolutely loved getting to work with students every day, but I felt claustrophobic being contained to an indoor classroom. Becoming a naturalist has allowed me to continue using my teaching skills in an environment that makes me feel more at home.

4. What sparked your interest in working with children?

Because I'm the voungest of eleven, I became an aunt when I was only eight years old. As I grew up, I spent a lot of time babysitting and loved seeing my nieces and nephews "discover" things that were new to them, especially outdoors. I now have 18 nieces and nephews, and the joy of watching them grow and achieve milestones never fades.

5. What is your favorite part of the job?

I love the creative aspect of this job! Over the summer, I had several opportunities a troll and "food spirit"

for summer camps. It is such a blast to see what can happen when grown ups collaborate to create immersive outdoor experiences for kids.

6. What's your favorite local green space?

Here at JMF, I love spending quiet moments observing birds and dragonflies at Mitchell Hill Lake. While this isn't an area we manage, Iroquois Park has a special place in my heart. I grew up playing on that playground and still enjoy running there with family and hiking there with my partner and pup. It never ceases to amaze me how many fascinating critters exist just beyond our urban core if you venture onto a trail!

7. Do you have a favorite plant to find in nature?

This time of year, I get a kick out of pawpaw hunting. Pawpaws are the largest native fruit in Kentucky, and they taste like a combination of bananas and mangoes. Yum!
