

Chickasaw Forest Play



NEW DEVELOPMENTS



Tom Wallace Improvement Project

It is a \$2.7 million improvement project for the Tom Wallace Recreation Area. The improvements include

- ~ Accessible path for lake access
 - ~ New picnic shelter
- ~ Boardwalk over a wetland area
 - ~ Additional parking
- ~ Designated fishing locations and a kayak launch

The first phase will be tree/debris removal. The parking lot will be closed for portions of this phase.

Land Management Perspectives

The Natural Areas Land Management team has been busy as usual this fall! They have completed invasive species removal at Chickasaw, Shawnee, Carson, Waverly (kudzu and encroaching trees around the lake), Cassell and Sullivan. They are continuing the habitat restoration work at McNeely Lake Park south, including invasive species removal and expansion and improvement of the critical habitat for Kentucky Glade Cress. The team also completed meadow management for this Fall, which involved supplemental seeding and dead-heading invasive species, at Waverly and Horine meadows.

The Land Management team also cared for trees (mulched, watered, pruned) previously planted through the LG&E Plant for the Planet grant. There was also the Fall 2023 ECHO tree planting of 66 trees at Horine. The team also planted about 10 trees at the Horine Conference Center and 6 more at the Programs Office. Natural Areas volunteers play a vital role in our work. With the help of volunteers, land management completed a new rock armored access path to the Orange and Red trails from the campground. During Tree Week Louisville, volunteers helped with mulching and watering trees at Cassell. Also during Tree Week, there was a reforestation planting at Joe Creason Park - with the help of 15 volunteers about 90 trees were planted. Our intrepid volunteers also helped in completing a new Environmental Education trail section for Natural Areas Programs division to use for summer camps and school groups.


The team also removed fallen trees on the trail, repaired trail blowouts in Paul Yost, took preventive steps to avoid erosion, trimmed and cleared overgrowth on trails and cleaned the Louisville Loop. They also installed three gravel walk-out pads for easier access to Shannon's Pond and cleared vegetation encroaching upon the pond. The team built and installed three new benches around the Shawnee Hiking trail. They removed hazardous trees in the Programs area and helped the Welcome Center and Programs teams with the installation of a pollinator garden at the Welcome Center in Jefferson Memorial Forest.
